NO SIGNS OF VIRUS

'MALAYSIA FREE FROM AFRICAN SWINE FEVER'

Surveillance being carried out at pig farms, but no cases detected, says DVS

THE Department of Veterinary Services (DVS) has assured that Malaysia is free from African Swine Fever (ASF), a disease that infects pigs and wild boars.

Director-general, Datuk Dr Quaza Nizamuddin Hassan said the clinical surveillance conducted at commercial pig farms in eight states had found no signs of ASF.

"Samplings conducted together with the Wildlife and National Parks Department (Perhilitan) on wild boars in seven states in the peninsula also found no signs of the ASF virus," he said in a statement.

ASF is a large, double-stranded DNA virus in the Asfarviridae family.

The virus causes haemorrhagic fever with high mortality rates in pigs, and can lead to death as quickly as a week upon infection.

Dr Quaza said the Malaysian Quarantine and Inspection Services (Maqis) had conducted random checks on 180 pork meat supplies imported into the country through West Port, Port of Pasir Gudang and Bukit Kayu Hitam, among countries that were affected by the virus since Nov 12 last year.

"Checks were also conducted on pork products that were brought in by passengers from countries with a high risk for ASF at KLIA, klia2, Penang, Johor Bahru, Kuching and Kota Kinabalu."

"So far, none of the samples had traces of ASF."

Dr Quaza said DVS had imposed a ban on imports of pork and pork products from China, Poland, Belgium, Thailand, Vietnam and Cambodia as a precautionary measure.

He said the department had conducted awareness campaign for pig farm owners and operators at all eight states to improve the farms' biosecurity.

WHAT IS AFRICAN SWINE FEVER?

A highly contagious haemorrhagic disease of pigs, warthogs, European wild boar and American wild pigs. All age groups are equally susceptible.

HOW DOES ASF SPREAD?

- The warthog can serve as a natural reservoir of the virus without any sign of the disease. The virus can spread from warthog via the soft tick Ornithodoros moubata. The tick will ingest the virus when taking a blood meal and then pass it on when feeding on susceptible animals.
- The virus is found in all bodily fluids and tissues of infected domestic pigs. It is usually transmitted directly or contact with infected ones or by ingestion of rubbish containing unprocessed infected pig meat or pig meat products.
- Biting flies and ticks, contaminated premises, vehicles, equipment or clothing can also spread the virus to susceptible animals.

WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF ASF?

Loss of appetite, high temperature, haemorrhages in the skin and internal organs, diarrhoea, depression, vomiting and difficulty with breathing and standing.

IS ASF A PUBLIC HEALTH THREAT?

ASF is not a risk to human health; non-swine pets or other livestock, it is a viral disease impacting only pigs.

PREVENTION AND CONTROL MEASURES?

Prevention in countries free of the disease depends on stringent import policies, ensuring that infected live pigs nor pork products are introduced into the country free of ASF. This includes ensuring proper disposal of waste food from aircraft, ships or vehicles coming from infected countries. In endemic areas, it is difficult to eliminate the warthog reservoir. Controlling tick vectors is important in preventing the disease. It is also important to ensure that meat from warthogs or infected animals is not fed to susceptible pigs.

After strict eradication programmes involve the rapid diagnosis, slaughter and disposal of all animals on an infected premises, thorough cleaning and disinfection, movement controls and surveillance.

Digigit anjing ketika bertugas

Scorang Penolong Pegawai Kesihatan Persekutuan Dewan Bandaraya Kuala Lumpur (DBKL) cedera di kaki kanannya selepas digigit anjing ketika menjalankan pemeriksaan di Titiwangsa, di sini, kelmarin.

Mangsa M. Visharani berkata, ketika kejadian itu, dia bersama kakitangan lain sedang melakukan pemeriksaan di sebuah rumah susulan aduan berhubung bahangan terpakai di kediaman berkenaan.

Menurutnya, dia meminta pemilik rumah bekerjasama bagi menyiasat berhubung aduan tersebut, namun lelaki itu enggan berbaur demikti an.

"Secara tiba-tiba seekor anjing yang tidak berantai di dalam rumah berkenaan mengejar sebelum meneriakkan saya ketika mahu bepergi.

Saya kemudian menaiki van dan mendapati kaki kanan luka akibat digigit anjing berkenaan lalu mendapatkan rawatan di Klinik DBKL," katanya ketika dihubungi di sini semalam.

Sementara itu, Pengarah Jabatan Kesihatan dan Alam Sekitar DBKL, Datuk Dr Noor Akma Shabuddin berkata, siasatan mendapati anjing berkenaan sebelum ini turut pernah menyerang pekerja syarikat pembersihan.

Menurut Dr Noor Akma, pihaknya menangkap anjing berkenaan untuk melihat simptom berkaitan rabies dan akan dipertimbangkan untuk pelupusan bagi tujuan kajian pengesahan penyakit rabies.
