1. Scope of Evaluation:

- 2.5 Indicate the minimum qualifications required for veterinary and technical staff employed by the official veterinary services at the central, regional, and local levels. - 4.3 Describe the details of the type of tests undertaken and their performance for their applied use (specificity and sensitivity).
- 4.4 Describe the procedures for reporting test results, including to whom they are reported and the average time between sample collection and reporting. If confirmatory testing is conducted outside of the region, estimate the time required to confirm a diagnosis.
- 4.5 Annual laboratory capacity in processing tests and samples. Describe any projections for laboratory resource needs in the event of an

outbreak. How would the requesting region meet the projected needs?

5. Structure of Swine Industry

- 5.1 Swine population (lists by district and general total and mentions the approximate number of each category (breeding, fattening), including commercial, non-commercial and, backyard, etc..)
- 5.2 Indicate the number of swine holdings, by district and category. Provide the map of the swine population to indicate its density.
- 5.3 Please describe the farming system (eg: closed house, open house, free range, etc.). Is compartmentalisation practised in the country.
- 5.4 Indicate the number and location of abattoir, processing plants and cold storage (include mapping).
- 5.5 Geographical factors. Provide a general description of the country including physical, geographical and other factors that are relevant to ASF dissemination, countries sharing common borders and other countries that although may not be adjacent share a link for the potential introduction of disease. Provide a map identifying the factors above.
- 5.6 Wild boar demographics. Provide the map of the wild boar population to indicate its density. Provide the measures in place to prevent contact between domestic and wild suids.
- 5.7 Swine industry:
 - 5.7.1 Is the swine industry fully or partially integrated? Explain the general structure(s) of the integration(s).
 - 5.7.2 Do the integrations have their own veterinarians and veterinary laboratories? If yes, are practitioners and other veterinary laboratories (almost) completely excluded from the official sector?
 - 5.7.3 Does the swine industry have its own animal health programmes (guidance, sanitary monitoring, vaccinations etc.)? If yes, have these programmes been discussed with (and eventually approved by) the authorities?
 - 5.7.4 Role of farmers, industry and other relevant groups in ASF surveillance and control (include a description of training and awareness programmes on ASF).
 - 5.7.5 Role of private veterinary profession in ASF surveillance and control.
- 5.8 Describe general patterns of livestock movement and marketing within the region. Indicate the location of any major marketing or assembly centers for species susceptible to ASF.

6. Notifiable Swine Disease

- 6.1 Indicate the list of notifiable swine diseases and describe briefly the notification procedure.
- 6.2 Which swine diseases are notified to WOA, and eventually, to other countries? Indicate for these diseases the notification frequency (immediate, monthly, annually).
- 6.3 Policy and procedure of disease outbreak notification to trade partners.

7. Disease situation and control

- 7.1 History. Provide a description of the ASF history in the country, date of first detection, origin of infection, date of eradication (date of last case), subtypes present and pathogenicity.
- 7.2 Provide maps showing the location of cases and/or outbreaks of ASF, in both domestic and wild suids, within the last 3 years. For each outbreak, provide the following information:
 - Species affected (domestic/wild)
 - Number of animals and premises involved
 - Mechanism by which the outbreak was detected
 - Probable source of infection
 - Results of the epidemiological investigation
 - Control measures implemented
 - Disposition of infected and exposed animals
 - Time required for eradication and control
- 7.3 Provide a map showing the range of any known wild suids reservoir for ASF. If there has been an outbreak in the past year, please provide the details of the outbreak according to region.
- 7.4 Presence of vectors of ASF in the country. If yes, please specify species of the vector and prevalence of disease in the vector.
- 7.4 Strategy. Describe how ASF was controlled and eradicated (e.g. stamping-out policy, modified stamping-out policy, zoning, etc.).
- 7.5 Vaccines and vaccination.
 - 7.5.1 Was the ASF vaccine ever used?
 - 7.5.2 If so, when was the last vaccination carried out?
 - 7.5.3 Please provide the policy of ASF vaccination and specify the type of vaccine used.
 - 7.5.4 When was the vaccination policy started?
 - 7.5.5 What species were vaccinated?
 - 7.5.6 Does the region/country practice emergency vaccination during an outbreak?
- 7.6 Legislation, organization and implementation of the ASF eradication

campaign. Provide a description of the organizational structure at the different levels. Indicate if detailed operational guidelines exist and give a brief summary.

- 7.7 Identification and registration:
 - 7.7.1 Provide copies (in English) of regulations pertaining to animal identification and farm registration.
 - 7.7.2 Describe the system used to identify individual animals or groups of animals within the region and identify the implementing authority. Indicate any recordkeeping requirements, including what records are kept, by whom, and where.
 - 7.7.3 Describe the system for registering livestock holdings. Indicate any recordkeeping requirements, including systems for recording.
 - 7.7.4 Describe any official requirements for movement of susceptible livestock species within the region (e.g., a health certificate, permit, or other notification form). Indicate any recordkeeping requirements, including what records are kept, by whom, and where.
 - 7.7.5 Describe compliance monitoring and enforcement activities as they pertain to animal identification, farm registration, and animal movements within the region, as well as the penalty system for noncompliance.

8. ASF Surveillance

- 8.1 Describe the status of adjacent regions/countries with regard to ASF, including the location and date of the most recent case or outbreak, if known.
- 8.2 Describe any cooperative agreements or programs with adjacent regions/countries for surveillance, prevention, and/or control of ASF.
- 8.3 Active surveillance
 - 8.3.1 Provide the following information regarding active surveillance in domestic livestock and wild suids as well as vectors, for each disease under evaluation:
 - The target population(s)
 - Risk factors considered in the surveillance approach
 - Targeted prevalence for detection
 - Estimated confidence level
 - Sampling plan
 - Types of samples collected
 - Types of laboratory testing
 - Frequency of sampling
 - 8.3.2 Provide the targeted and actual numbers of samples collected, by including domestic and wild suids. Indicate the results of screening and confirmatory testing for the past 3 years, including any false

positive results. Describe the procedures for investigating positive results.

8.3.3 Specify the entity or unit responsible for analysing surveillance data and updating the surveillance plan(s). How often does this occur?

8.4 Passive surveillance

8.4.1 Describe the type and extent of passive surveillance activities for each disease under evaluation, including who does the reporting, the type of information reported, and how reports are verified.

8.4.2 Describe any outreach activities of the official veterinary services designed to increase awareness, recognition, and reporting of ASF among producers, industry members, official and private veterinarians, and the general public.

8.4.3 Provide the number of suspicious cases of each disease under evaluation that were reported to the official veterinary services over the past 3 years and describe the follow-up measures taken in each case.

9. Contingency Plan and Outbreak Management

9.1 Give details of any written guidelines available to the official services for dealing with suspected or confirmed outbreaks of ASF (including contingency plans).

9.2 Describe quarantine and procedures imposed on premises with suspicious cases pending final diagnosis.

9.3 In the event of ASF outbreak:

9.3.1 Indicate the sampling and testing procedures to be used to identify and confirm presence of the pathogenic agent; Time required to confirm the disease.

9.3.2 Describe the actions to be taken to report and control the disease situation in and around any establishments found to be infected with ASF.

9.3.3 Indicate the control or eradication procedures (e.g. stamping-out policy, partial slaughter or vaccination, methods of disposal of carcasses and other contaminated products and materials, decontamination, etc.) that would be taken. Include information on access to antigen and vaccine banks.

9.3.4 Describe the procedures to be used to confirm successful control or eradication, including any cleaning and sanitation procedures, restocking provisions, sentinel animal, environmental sampling and

serological surveillance programmes.

9.3.5 Give details of any compensation payments made available to farmers, etc. when animals are slaughtered for disease control or eradication purposes and their prescribed timetable.

10. Importation Policy

- 10.1 Describe briefly the rules and the inspection procedures governing importation of live pigs, semen, pork and pork products with reference to legal documents (eventual quarantine, animal health guarantees, for model of certificates, testing, etc.). Provide the summary in table form.
- 10.2 Are imports allowed from countries or regions, which are not free from ASF? If so, are there any additional guarantees required for such imports?
- 10.3 Provide details on the inspection body in charge of the inspection at the border and their relationship, accountability and communication with the central competent veterinary authority.
- 10.4 Describe the documentation required for entry of animal commodities that could harbour ASF into the region and provide examples of pertinent documents.
- 10.5 Describe the quarantine requirements for live animals entering the region, including the length of quarantine, veterinary inspection, and testing for ASF. Where are the quarantine facilities located (with mapping) and who maintains oversight?
- 10.6 Describe the mechanisms in place to track animal commodities in transit within the region and to confirm exit or arrival at the point of destination. How are tracking records maintained and who is responsible for oversight of the tracking system?
- 10.7 Describe any required biosecurity procedures for live-haul trucks (loaded or empty).
- 10.8 Describe the procedures and the responsible party for the safe disposal of swine waste from international traffic and the procedures for disposition of commercial consignments that do not pass veterinary inspection and other prohibited animal commodities seized at entry point.
- 10.9 Describe the standard operation procedure for an illegal importation. Describe the procedures and the responsible party for the safe disposal of poultry commodities illegally imported to the region (if any).

11. Provide information related to established mutual arrangement on ASF control, zoning or compartmentalization with other trading partners.
