ANIMALS ORDINANCE, 1953

IN exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (1) of section 5 of the Animals Ordinance, 1953, the Minister of Agriculture hereby makes the following Order: 17 of 1953.

1. This Order may be cited as the **Animals (Importation) Order, 1962.** Citation.
2. Subject to the provisions of the Animals Rules, 1962, relating to landing place, the animals and birds specified in column one of the First Schedule to this Order may subject to the restrictions specified in column four, be imported into the Federation from the countries or parts of the countries specified in column two, for the purposes specified in column three of the said Schedule. Importation of Animals.  
L.N. 323/62.
3. (1) The importation into the Federation from any country except under written permission issued in accordance with the Animals Ordinance, 1953, of the following articles is hereby prohibited— Prohibition of imports of carcasses, etc.
  - (a) Carcase of any animal or bird or any part thereof including meat (frozen, chilled, dried, dehydrated, salted, pickled or smoked), meat meal, bones and bone meal, hides and skins, hoofs, horns, hoof meal and horn meal, offal and any other product of animal or bird origin.
  - (b) Semen, fodder, litter, dung or any substance of animals or birds.
  - (c) Vaccines (dead, living or attenuated), sera, for use on animals or birds.
- (2) Subject to the provisions of paragraph 3 (i) the carcasses or products of the animals or birds specified in the first column of the Second Schedule to this Order may subject to the restrictions specified in column four thereof, be imported into the Federation from the countries

or parts of the countries specified in column two, for the purposes specified in column three of the said Schedule.

(3) The carcases or products of animals or birds aforesaid may be imported into the Federation at any of the following stations or ports—

- (i) the railway station at Johore Bahru;
- (ii) the Customs Station at Johore Bahru;
- (iii) the port of Penang or Butterworth;
- (iv) the port of Port Swettenham; or
- (v) the airport of Kuala Lumpur.

Transshipment

4. Any carcase or product of any animal or bird transhipped in Singapore for onward transmission to the Federation shall be accompanied by either—

- (a) a certificate from a veterinary authority in Singapore certifying that the carcase or product was imported into Singapore in accordance with the provisions of this Order; or
- (b) the original certificates in respect thereof from the country of origin.

Revocation.

5. All orders made or directions given under any of the written laws repealed by the Ordinance and in force immediately prior to the coming into force of this Order are hereby revoked.

### ROAD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE, 1958

In exercise of the powers conferred by sub-section (1) of section 61 of the Road Traffic Ordinance, 1958, the Commissioner of the Federal Capital of Kuala Lumpur, after consultation with the Commissioner of Road Transport, hereby makes the following Order: 49 of 1958.

1. This Order may be cited as the **Road Traffic (Prohibition of Driving) No. 3 Order, 1962.** Citation.

2. For the purpose of facilitating the reconstruction of the road specified in the Schedule hereto, the driving of vehicles on the said road between the points specified in the second column of the said Schedule is hereby prohibited. Prohibition.
