'Tolong Cari Pembunuh Kucing'

PETALING JAYA – Tindakan seorang lelaki yang dipercayai membunuh dua ekor kucing di sebuah pangsapuri di Lembah Klang baru-baru ini mendapat kecaman orang ramai yang menyifatkan perbuatan itu sebagai kejam.

Menerusi perkongsian hantaran pengguna di aplikasi Threads, lelaki tersebut melempar dua ekor kucing ke dinding selepas mengambilnya dari bungkusan plastik yang dipegangnya.

“Lelaki itu mengeluarkan dua ekor anak kucing dari beg. Kucing berwarna hitam kemudian dilempar ke dinding, manakala kucing putih didapati sudah mati ketika itu.

“Selepas itu, dia mengambil semula kucing hitam tersebut dan mencampaknya pula ke bawah (tangga),” ujarinya.

Video itu dirakam melalui rakaman televisyen litar tertutup (CCTV) sebuah rumah yang memaparkan lelaki tersebut melakukan

tindakan kejam itu di hadapan sangkar kucing.

Insiden itu mengejutkan pengguna media sosial apabila lelaki tersebut melakukan tindakan kejam itu turut menyepak kedua-dua anak kucing yang sudah mati.

Menjengah ke ruangan komen, ramai mengecam tindakan kejam lelaki berkenaan turut membuat aduan kepada Jabatan Perkhidmatan Veterinar.

“Kalau tengok keadaan anak kucing itu, dia (lelaki) terbalikkan beg plastik sebab nak buang air. Maksudnya dia lemaskan anak kucing itu dulu ke?,” komen @Ninila_r

“Walaupun tak suka kucing, kita sebagai manusia ada akal fikiran. Memang geram kucing berak merata tapi takkan sesekali sanggup buat tindakan kejam seperti itu,” kata Kamil.

“Semoga pihak berwajib dikenakan tindakan keras keatas pelaku. Kalau ikutkan hati rasa nak buat balik, biar lelaki itu rasa perasaan kucing diperlakukan begitu,” kata Ain. -[KOSMO! ONLINE](#)

MAVMA to Strengthen Poultry Partnerships for Food Security

The Malaysian Veterinary Medical Association is boosting collaboration across the poultry sector to safeguard Malaysia's food supply.

The Malaysian Veterinary Medical Association (MAVMA) has pledged to intensify collaboration with integrators, feed companies, and policymakers to strengthen Malaysia's poultry industry as part of a broader push to safeguard national food security.

The commitment was made at the association's annual conference and general meeting, held in Kuala Lumpur on September 27-28, which drew over 300 veterinary professionals, academics, and industry

stakeholders.

A key highlight of the event was the appointment of Chee Liung Wun as MAVMA President for the 2025-2027 term.

In his first comments to the poultry sector, Dr Chee stressed that securing Malaysia's poultry supply chain is "fundamental to national food security" and requires shared responsibility across the industry.

"As President of MAVMA, I

recognize that a robust and secure poultry sector is fundamental to Malaysia's national food security. My approach will be built on proactive collaboration, scientific excellence, and shared responsibility across all key stakeholders," Dr Chee told aviNews Asia.

Collaboration with Integrators

MAVMA will work closely with poultry integrators through the Federation of Livestock Farmers Associations of Malaysia (FLFAM) to advance best practices in animal health, welfare, and biosecurity.

The association will also serve as a bridge between integrators and the Department of Veterinary Services (DVS), particularly regional diagnostic laboratories, to improve early disease detection and response.

To support this agenda, MAVMA's new executive committee includes several poultry practitioners.

"We are intentionally bringing experienced poultry professionals into leadership, and we will collaborate with private consultants to run joint seminars and training sessions on disease management and integration

best practices," Dr Chee said.

Partnering with Feed Companies

Feed safety and cost remain central concerns for producers. MAVMA will strengthen collaboration with the Malaysian Feedmillers Association and DVS to provide input during public consultations and on the implementation of the Feed Act.

"This partnership will ensure stringent quality control, transparent sourcing, and adherence to safety standards in feed production," Dr Chee explained.

"We also want to see stronger collaboration on nutrition optimization and traceability, which are vital for both poultry health and productivity."

Engaging Policymakers

MAVMA is also positioning itself as a key advocate for science-based policymaking in poultry and livestock. The association will continue to co-host educational seminars with DVS and support campaigns such as World Antimicrobial Awareness Week, World Egg Day, and the Livestock Malaysia exhibition.

Dr Chee emphasized that MAVMA will push for biosecurity incentives, investment in R&D, and stronger crisis preparedness strategies to respond to poultry disease emergencies.

“By fostering these critical partnerships, MAVMA aims to create a synergistic ecosystem where innovation, health, and sustainability drive the poultry sector forward,” he told aviNews Asia.

“Our ultimate goal is to ensure a consistent supply of safe, affordable, and high-quality poultry products for all Malaysians, thereby strengthening our national food security for generations to come.”-[AVINEWS.COM](https://www.avinews.com)

Animal Advocates Push for Welfare, Disaster Units in 2026 Budget

PETALING JAYA: Animal advocates say the 2026 budget should include allocations for dedicated units on animal welfare enforcement and disaster response.

Animal rights lawyer Rajesh Nagarajan proposed the creation of a specialised animal welfare enforcement unit, following examples from Sweden and the Netherlands.

In Sweden, trained officers work closely with veterinarians and inspectors to handle cruelty cases, while

the Netherlands has a dedicated “animal police” unit that investigates complaints, rescues animals, and ensures that offenders are prosecuted, he said.

“Malaysia could adopt a similar model to professionalise enforcement and ensure that animal welfare laws are not treated as secondary offences,” he told FMT. “These steps would make enforcement more robust and signal zero tolerance for cruelty.”

Rajesh, who is the

Pertubuhan Pelindungan Khazanah Alam (Peka) president, said the 2026 budget should include reforms to close enforcement gaps, citing the rising frequency of animal cruelty cases.

He proposed fast-track courts, training for enforcement agencies, a national animal offender registry, and funding for shelters to care for seized animals.

He also called for animal cruelty offences to be accorded the same level of seriousness as crime against people.

“Stronger penalties, real reform of the Animal Welfare Act, and a dedicated animal enforcement unit are essential, but the real problem is not just the law, but the failure of enforcement.

“If the department of veterinary services cannot bring cases to court despite its resources, then enforcement must be restructured,” he said.

Persatuan Haiwan Terbiar Malaysia (SAFM) called for the establishment of an animal disaster response unit, fully equipped with 4x4 rescue vehicles, boats, cages, and trained personnel to save

animals during floods and fires.

SAFM president R Kalaivanan pointed out that in previous disasters, animals have often been left behind, highlighting the urgent need for such a unit to complement human rescue operations.

He also called for subsidies for veterinary treatment when strays are sick, injured, or abused. “At present, all treatment costs fall on NGOs and volunteers, which limits how many animals can be helped,” he said.

Kalaivanan suggested that the government introduce affordable licensing and microchipping for pets to reduce abandonment and improve owner accountability, saying this would help tackle the root cause of stray overpopulation.

He urged the government to support community feeding by establishing officially recognised and regulated feeding stations with proper hygiene standards, to reduce stray-human conflict in residential areas and improve public health.

He also said allocations to registered NGOs running shelters to cover operational costs such as food, rental,

and salaries are much needed.

Kalaivanan reiterated a call for a structured sterilisation and vaccination programme to reduce stray populations humanely.

“Currently, this is underfunded and carried out in an ad hoc manner by NGOs. Federal funding would allow a coordinated and large-scale rollout,” he said.-

KUALA LUMPUR: Kerajaan tidak bercadang menyatukan semua institusi pendidikan dan latihan teknikal dan vokasional (TVET) di bawah satu kementerian.

Sebaliknya, Timbalan Perdana Menteri, Datuk Seri Dr Ahmad Zahid Hamidi, berkata kerajaan memilih pendekatan penyelarasan berpusat yang lebih praktikal dengan memperkukuh ekosistem TVET melalui dasar

serta inisiatif strategik di peringkat nasional.

Beliau berkata demikian dalam jawapan bertulis Parlimen. Beliau menjawab soalan Datuk Dr Nik Muhammad Zawawi Salleh (PN-Pasir Puteh) mengenai sama ada kementerian bercadang untuk menyatukan atau menyelaraskan institusi yang menawarkan program TVET di bawah satu bumbung kementerian

sahaja bagi tujuan pemerkasaan yang lebih berfokus.

Sebagai langkah utama, Ahmad Zahid berkata, kerajaan sudah menubuhkan Majlis TVET Negara (MTVET) sebagai platform tertinggi dalam membuat keputusan dasar berkaitan hala tuju TVET kebangsaan.

"Keanggotaan MTVET merangkumi semua kementerian penyedia TVET serta pelbagai pemegang taruh berkaitan.

"Menerusi kerjasama dan komitmen semua pihak, MTVET menjadi badan penyelaras yang merencana agenda TVET negara, sekali gus berperanan sebagai pemacu utama dalam merealisasikan hasrat Kerajaan untuk memperkasa TVET," katanya.

Dalam pada itu, Ahmad Zahid yang juga Menteri Kemajuan Desa dan Wilayah berkata, dibawah Rancangan Malaysia Ketiga Belas (RMK13), kerajaan juga sudah merancang untuk menubuhkan Suruhanjaya TVET.

"Langkah ini adalah salah satu strategi di bawah inisiatif memperkukuh ekosistem TVET di Malaysia.

"Suruhanjaya TVET akan

menjadi entiti khusus dengan mandat yang jelas untuk mengawal selia, memantau dan menyelaraskan pelaksanaan TVET secara bersepadu di peringkat nasional.

"Dengan adanya Suruhanjaya ini, keseluruhan ekosistem TVET yang membabitkan kementerian, agensi dan pihak berkepentingan dapat digembleng secara lebih teratur, cekap dan berkesan, selaras dengan hala tuju pembangunan ekonomi negara," katanya.-[BHONLINE](#)
