GERIK, 20 Sept: Pasukan Gerakan Am (PGA) menumpaskan cubaan menyeludup 100 ekor kambing jenis Boer dari Thailand menerusi Op Bersepadu Khazanah di Gerik, semalam.

Komander Briged Utara PGA Ulu Kinta SAC Shahrums Hashim berkata dalam operasi bermula 4.30 petang hingga 5 pagi itu, pihaknya turut menahan dua lelaki tempatan berusia 28 dan 41 tahun bagi membantu siasatan.

Beliau berkata operasi itu dijalankan Cawangan Risik Batalion 18 PGA dengan kerjasama Jabatan Veterinar Cawangan Taiping dan Bahagian Siasatan Jenayah Narkotik Ibu Pejabat Polis Daerah (IPD) Gerik.

“Pasukan operasi mengesan kegiatan penyeludupan haiwan yang diseludup masuk dari Thailand dan dipasarkan secara tidak sah di pasaran tempatan sejak tiga bulan lepas,” katanya dalam kenyataan hari ini.

Shahrums berkata turut

dirampas dalam operasi semalam sebuah lori dengan anggaran keseluruhan rampasan bernilai RM260,000 dan kes disiasat mengikut Seksyen 36(1) Akta Binatang 1953 (Akta 647).

Beliau berkata PGA Briged Utara akan terus mempergiat rondaan dan pengawasan di kawasan sempadan bagi membanteras jenayah penyeludupan, selain menyeru masyarakat supaya menyalurkan maklumat berkaitan kepada pihak berkuasa. -TVS

Menurut laporan Kosmo!, restoran mi segera tersebut sebelum ini tular di media sosial selepas ramai pelanggan dan netizen meluahkan kebimbangan

mengenai keadaan seekor Alpaca yang kelihatan tertekan dan murung ketika dipamerkan di premis berkenaan.

Pemilik Restoran Dikenakan Denda RM10,000

Datuk Bandar MBMB, Datuk Shadan Othman, memaklumkan bahawa pemilik restoran dikenakan denda RM10,000 di bawah Enakmen Hiburan dan Tempat-tempat Hiburan 2001 serta RM250 kerana melanggar Undang-undang Kecil Petempatan Makanan (MBMB) 2020.

Dalam dunia perniagaan yang kompetitif, pelbagai cara unik digunakan untuk menarik perhatian pelanggan. Viral Alpaca Pet Café in Melaka Shut Down After Welfare Concerns Spark Outrage

A café in Melaka has come under heavy criticism after a viral video revealed an alpaca standing alone at the entrance of the premises. Marketed as a quirky “pet café,” the establishment quickly drew online attention for its unusual attraction. However, instead of delight, the sight of the lonely alpaca sparked widespread outrage.

Further videos shared online showed that the café also housed goats, rabbits, geese, ducks, and cats within its two-storey premises. Many of these animals appeared to be living in cramped and unhygienic conditions, forced

to walk on their own excrement with a strong stench of urine and faeces permeating the air. Visitors described the environment as unbearable, questioning how anyone could dine inside.

Animal rights group Stray Free Foundation highlighted the issue on social media, with posts that rapidly went viral. They documented animals kept in small enclosures, some stained with excrement on the walls and floors. Particularly worrying was footage of the alpaca chewing on an artificial green mat,

seemingly mistaking it for grass.

Authorities Step In

The growing backlash prompted swift intervention by the Melaka City Council (MBMB). A midnight raid was conducted by enforcement officers led by mayor Datuk Shadan Othman. Following the inspection, the café was slapped with a seven-day

for violating the Food Establishment By-law (MBMB) 2020.

Shadan stressed that keeping an alpaca or any animals inside a food business was a clear breach of food safety and hygiene regulations. He revealed that the café's first floor had been converted into a makeshift "mini zoo" without any official approval, serving as a free attraction



closure order to allow for thorough cleaning and the removal of all animals from the premises.

In addition, the Singaporean café owner—who is reportedly a permanent resident in Malaysia—was fined a total of RM10,250. This comprised RM10,000 under the Entertainment and Places of Entertainment Enactment 2001 and RM250

for customers.

“This concept may appear interesting to the public, but it goes against the law and compromises animal welfare,” Shadan said.

No Clear Guidelines on Exotic Animals

The case also highlighted a legal grey area regarding the

licensing of exotic animals in commercial premises. Deputy Exco for Science, Technology, Innovation, and Digital Communication, Datuk Mohd Noor Helmy, who accompanied Shadan during the raid, pointed out that housing animals in eateries is prohibited—even if they are separated by walls and doors.

Owner Defends Himself

The café owner, identified only as Ong, has since defended himself against accusations of animal abuse. He admitted it was a mistake to display the alpaca in a dining environment but denied any deliberate mistreatment.



However, he admitted there was still no definitive guidance from either the Department of Veterinary Services or the Department of Wildlife and National Parks Peninsular Malaysia (Perhilitan) on whether alpacas could be legally kept in such venues.

“This uncertainty needs to be addressed quickly,” he said, adding that the welfare of the animals and the safety of customers must remain the priority.

“I understand that some people are upset and believe I mistreated the alpaca. But I truly love these animals. I even bought two alpacas for RM20,000 each—why would I want to harm them?” Ong said.

He accepted the seven-day closure order and pledged to relocate the animals to more suitable conditions while cleaning up the café. “I will not give up on this business concept, but I will make the necessary changes,” he

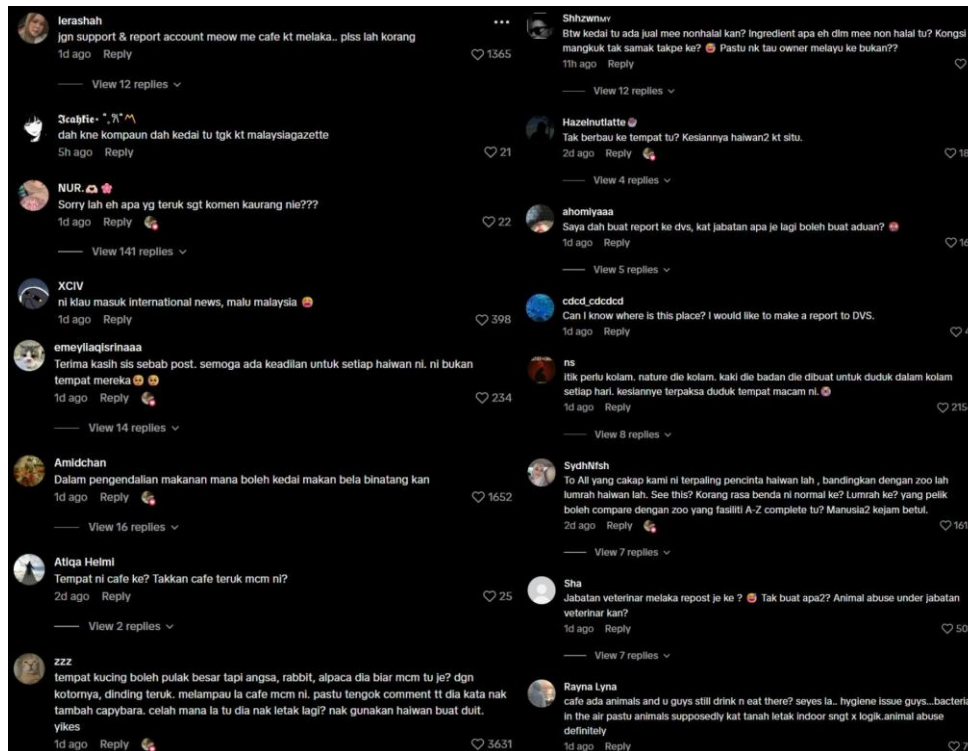
added.

Public Backlash and Online Reactions

Netizens reacted strongly to the situation, with many expressing sympathy for the alpaca. Comments under viral TikTok videos described the animal as “lonely,”

Others questioned how customers could eat in a restaurant that smelled strongly of animal waste, with one commenting, “How do you all manage to dine there? The stench must be unbearable.”

“bored,” and “out of place,” with users urging that it be returned to its natural habitat.

“I thought the alpaca was just for the café’s opening day, but months have passed, and it’s still there. How was this even allowed?” one user wrote. Another remarked, “I pass by this café every night. The alpaca just stands there staring—it looks so lonely. It needs to be back with its kind.”

The incident has reignited debate on the ethics of animal cafés in Malaysia. While such establishments often market themselves as offering “unique experiences,” critics argue that they can easily cross into exploitation if the welfare of the animals is not prioritised.

Alpaca Seen Living in Filthy Conditions at Melaka Pet Cafe, SG Owner Claims He's an 'Animal Lover'

While pet cafes are places that allow customers to get up and close with animals, it can quickly turn into a health hazard for both humans and animals if not done properly.

A pet cafe in Melaka which achieved online fame for housing an alpaca within its premises was recently raided by the authorities following multiple allegations of animals being kept in unlivable conditions.

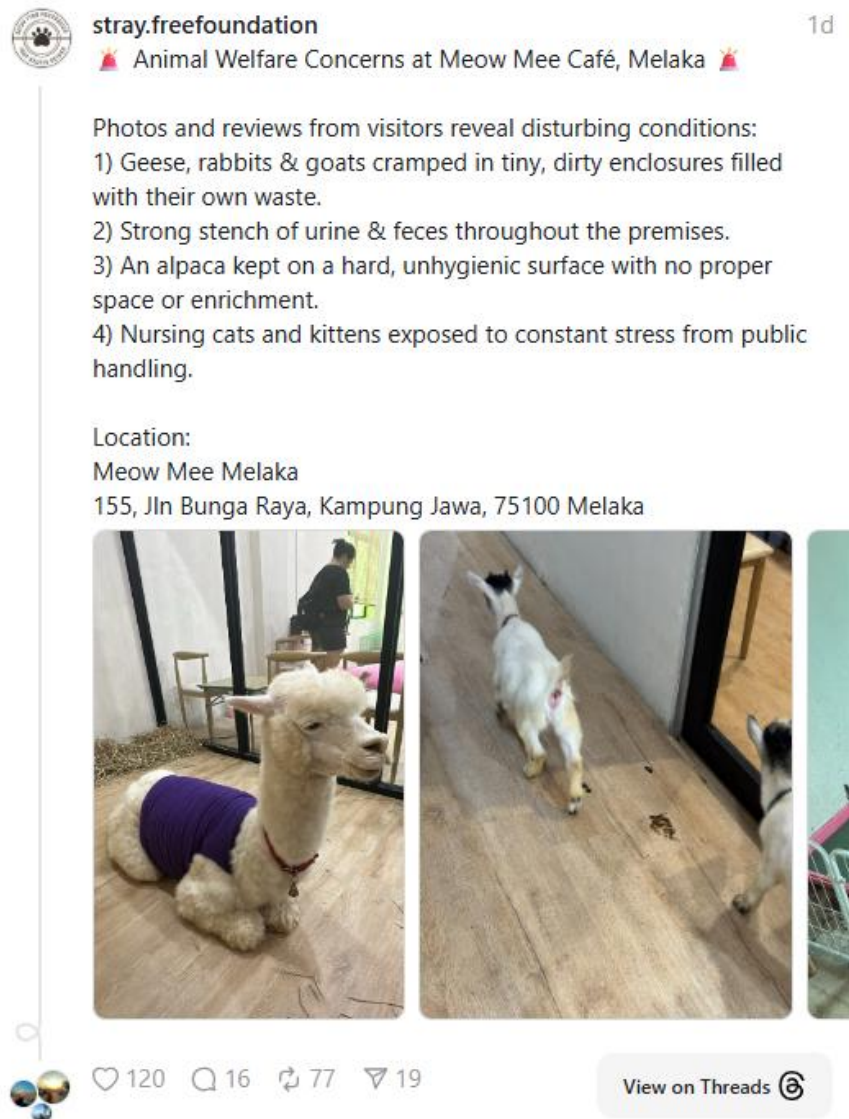
Online Claims Of Animal Abuse

The matter was first brought to light in a Threads post by an animal rights group, which brought forth several troubling allegations against the pet cafe.

According to the post, several animals, which included goats, geese, cats, rabbits, and the alpaca, were made to live in tiny, dirty enclosures while smeared in their own excrement.

Aside from that, visitors also complained of the stench of urine and faeces being “marinated” right through

the cafe's walls due to poor hygiene. (MBMB) ordered the pet cafe to close for seven days.



There were also allegations that the alpaca munched away on a green mat after it mistook it for real grass.

Authorities Step In

Thankfully, it didn't take long for the authorities to act on these claims, who decided to pay the pet cafe a "surprise visit".

According to Melaka mayor Datuk Shadan Othman, he said the Melaka City Council

The cafe owner, a Singaporean man, was also issued a RM10,250 compound for violating the Entertainment and Places of Entertainment Enactment 2001 and RM250 for violating the Food Establishment By-law (MBMB) 2020, reported Sinar Harian.

Deputy Exco for Science, Technology, Innovation, and Digital Communication, Datuk Mohd Noor Helmy, who was also present at the raid, said housing animals

within a food business premises are forbidden, even if they're kept apart by separate walls and doors.

He added that so far, there hasn't been a clear directives given by the Department of Veterinary Services and the Department of Wildlife and National Parks Peninsular Malaysia (Perhilitan) regarding the permit and suitability of the location for the alpaca.

"I understand some people are angry and have claimed I'm mistreating the alpaca. But I really love the animal as I bought two alpacas for RM20,000 each. How could I possibly harm them?"

'I Love Animals'

The pet cafe owner, known as Ong, admitted his fault in displaying the alpaca within an eatery but denied accusations of animal abuse.

"However, I'll not give up on the business. I also accept the seven-day closure order and will immediately relocate all the animals to a proper place, in addition to cleaning up the cafe," he said.-

Animal or pet cafes can be a unique experience if done right. However, a pet cafe featuring an alpaca in Melaka has been slammed by many after a video of the lonely alpaca went viral.

Based on several other videos online, the cafe has other animals such as goats, geese, cats, and rabbits, seemingly kept in filthy living conditions inside the two-storey premises.

The animals had to walk on their own excrement and

breathe the foul air. According to reports compiled by the Stray Free Foundation, visitors who had been to the cafe reported the bad urine smell and excrement staining the walls. It's a wonder how anyone could dine inside at all.

The visitors added that the animals were kept in enclosures that were too small. What was worrying was seeing the alpaca chew on the green mat probably because it thought it was real grass.

Another visitor claimed to see a mother cat trying to nurse her kittens but there were other people trying to play with them.

The horrifying scenes made many people worry about the welfare and well-being of the animals in the shop.

The Authorities Are Taking Action

Once the issue caught the attention of the Melaka City Council (MBMB), the pet cafe was ordered to close for seven days for cleaning up works.

Mayor of Melaka Datuk Shadan Othman said a compound of up to RM10,250 has also been issued to the Singaporean owner, which is RM10,000 under the Entertainment and Places of Entertainment Enactment 2001 and RM250 for violating the Food Establishment By-law (MBMB) 2020.

Shadan added that keeping an alpaca in the store violated the food safety and hygiene guidelines.

He further shared that the cafe's first floor was turned into a mini zoo without permission from the authorities. The mini zoo serves as a free attraction for cafe customers.

Shadan said the concept is interesting but it went against the rules and affects animal rights.

Deputy Exco for Science, Technology, Innovation, and Digital Communication, Datuk Mohd Noor Helmy, who visited the cafe with Shadan, said placing animals within a food business premises, even if they're separated by walls and doors, aren't allowed.

However, he shared that there are no clear answers between the Department of Veterinary Services and the Department of Wildlife and National Parks Peninsular Malaysia (Perhilitan) regarding the permit and suitability of the location for the alpaca.-[THERAKYATPOST](#)
